Every year, a group called the Internal Examination Committee is set up to handle things related to how we evaluate internally. This group keeps track of what we do during internal exams, including any issues students have. If students have a problem with how their work is evaluated, they can talk to their department head or their

teachers who teach that subject. The teachers and departments make sure to sort out these problems quickly, usually at the department level, so the students are happy. If a student still isn't happy after talking to their teacher, they can go to the department head or the Internal Examination Committee.

Sometimes, students can't take exams because of special reasons, like being in national or state sports competitions or being sick. In those cases, the Internal Examination Committee arranges a separate exam.

For the big exams at the end of the year or semester, we have a way to deal with problems too. Students who want their marks double-checked can find out how to do that from the college office, the help desk, or any teacher. The university then checks the marks again, following the right steps. If a student is still not happy after that, there's another way for them to ask for their marks to be checked again.

In the old building, postgraduate departments including Political Science, Sociology, and History find their home, each equipped with internet-enabled computers and well-ventilated classrooms. Additionally, facilities such as the library, sports department, and canteen contribute to the holistic student experience. The canteen upholds high standards of cleanliness and hygiene to cater to the diverse needs of the student body.

The RUSA building adds further value with its six classrooms, Geography department, and laboratory, all equipped with modern technology and practical resources. Notably, a Smart Classroom equipped with contemporary audio-visual teaching aids enhances the pedagogical approach. Separate washroom facilities for boys and girls ensure sanitation and privacy, reflecting the institution's commitment to student welfare and academic excellence.

#### 4.2 - Library as a Learning Resource

The library has undergone automation through the implementation of an Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), specifically utilizing the SOUL 2.0 software. Despite challenges posed by the Covid-19 epidemic, which hindered the provision of comprehensive training for both the librarian and computer operator, substantial progress has been made. Data pertaining to almost all available books has been successfully integrated into the ILMS software.

One notable feature of the library's automation is the incorporation of the N-LIST facility, designed to facilitate easy access to e-resources. This includes a wide array of national and international level journals, e-books, and reference materials, all accessible online. These resources serve both students and faculty members, aiding them in their endeavors such as study material acquisition, assignment completion, and research work.

As for the library's collection, it boasts nearly 23,300 books covering various subjects and disciplines. The ILMS software utilized is SOUL 2.0, which has been partially automated. The nature of automation is classified as partial, indicating that while significant aspects of library operations have been streamlined through the software, there may still be manual processes in place.

4.4.2 - There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

The college maintains a structured approach to managing its physical, academic, and support facilities. With three buildings housing 20 classrooms, 7 laboratories, 3 ICT-equipped classrooms, and 2 Girls' common rooms, the infrastructure meets the college's needs. Additionally, the library, sports facilities, and 35 computers with internet access are appropriately allocated. A mini stadium caters to outdoor sports activities, while Wi-Fi coverage spans the entire campus, complemented by surveillance via 25 CCTV cameras. Adhering to UGC and state education department guidelines ensures academic and procedural integrity.

To ensure efficient facility management, the college forms various committees. Shortages in supporting staff are mitigated by hiring daily wage workers through self-financing and community initiatives. Laboratory maintenance falls under department heads' purview, supported by assistants, while library operations benefit from designated support staff. A trained sports officer promotes student engagement in sports for holistic development. With over 100 computers available, vacancies in computer operator positions are filled temporarily through self-financing. Contractual teachers ensure continuity in computer science education. Additional support staff are sourced through community participation to maintain optimal functioning of computer facilities. This comprehensive approach ensures the effective utilization and upkeep of college resources.

#### 6.3.5 - Institutions Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

The Institutions Performance Appraisal System encompasses evaluations for both teaching and non-teaching staff. Teaching staff undergo performance appraisal according to guidelines set by the Department of Higher Education, Government of Chhattisgarh, in alignment with UGC standards. Confidential reports and API forms are submitted by teaching staff, detailing their session's academic

contributions such as paper presentations, research publications, student guidance, curriculum development, and administrative duties. API scores are assessed by the IQAC and forwarded to the SLQAC for approval. Principals evaluate CR forms, assigning grades ranging from excellent to poor, which are then reviewed by Regional Additional Directors (AD) and forwarded to the Secretary of Higher Education for final acceptance.

For Librarians and Sports Officers, separate performance appraisal forms are tailored to reflect the specifics of their roles, following the same evaluation process as teaching staff.

Additionally, distinct CR proformas are available for class three and four employees, assessing criteria like physical capacity, punctuality, and decision-making abilities. This comprehensive system ensures equitable and thorough evaluations across all staff categories, promoting accountability and continuous improvement within the institution.

This committee diligently monitors expenses and scrutinizes cashbooks throughout the year. The accounts section maintains various financial records such as receipts, payments, ledger books, cheque issue registers, Daily Fee Collection (DFC) records, vouchers, and bills, all meticulously documented by the institution's Assistant Grade-II accountant. Additionally, a monthly expenditure report is diligently prepared and submitted to the Directorate of Higher Education.

Externally, the financial transactions of the college span multiple categories, including Government, Non-Government, Self-finance, Jan Bhagidari, UGC, and RUSA funds. These transactions undergo rigorous external audits as mandated by state government regulations. The audit of Government and Non-Government funds is conducted by the audit section of the Department of Higher Education and the Accountant General of the CG office. Furthermore, Jan Bhagidari and Self-finance accounts undergo scrutiny by Chartered Accountants annually, while UGC and RUSA accounts are also subject to CA audits as needed. The most recent external audit conducted by the Accountant General took place in June 2021. With over 350 trees on campus, garden waste is abundantly generated, promptly converted into compost, fostering sustainable agriculture practices. Students actively engage in these initiatives, gaining insight into agricultural sustainability, particularly beneficial for those hailing from rural backgrounds.

To minimize paper consumption, electronic displays and smartphone communication disseminate information efficiently, promoting ecofriendly habits. Discouraging plastic use, the institution collaborates with local municipalities for non-biodegradable waste collection at regular intervals.

Liquid waste management prioritizes resource optimization, with RO purifier wastewater repurposed for sanitation and gardening, while toilet wastewater is channeled into a septic tank.

A comprehensive waste recycling system features three tanks dedicated to NADEP and vermi composting, transforming garden waste into organic fertilizer for campus gardens. Additionally, defective items like instruments and furniture undergo recycling processes, emphasizing resource conservation and waste reduction. These initiatives underscore the institution's commitment to environmental stewardship and sustainable development.
